

No place for Palantir in a democratic Europe!

We are European organisations demanding that our governments and the European Commission scrap all existing public sector contracts with the US tech company Palantir Technologies and permanently end our states' links to this firm.

Links to far-right projects and oppression

Palantir is a US tech company that makes tools and software that are widely used by governments for [surveillance](#) and [AI warfare](#).

In the US, Palantir has supplied data mining tools to ICE which uses them to track migrants and trawl through information including [social media](#) posts, [location](#) history and [health data](#).

Its software has also been used in predictive policing in [Los Angeles](#) and [New Orleans](#), a policing practice which [automates and deepens](#) the impact of existing institutional biases.

Palantir's tools are used by [the Israeli military](#) and its CEO has [expressed pride](#) in the company's support for Israel, even as the state faces [genocide proceedings](#) at the International Court of Justice.

Its record should disqualify it from involvement in the operations and functioning of democratic governments. Yet it has been handed public sector contracts throughout Europe, ranging from [healthcare](#) to [military and policing](#).

Corporate capture of the public sector

European democracies have suffered decades of corporate capture, with private interests increasingly entrenched at the heart of governments. But we believe Palantir's advance into our public institutions poses particular risks to civil rights and democracy.

One issue is the technologies themselves, which are designed to rapidly [process and analyse](#) information, facilitating [increased surveillance](#) and amplifying the repressive powers of the state. The incorporation of such freedom-threatening technologies into the state, achieved with little debate or transparency, is a threat to vulnerable groups and popular movements.

Further, dependence on the company reinforces the strength of – and makes us increasingly dependent on – a class of tech billionaires whose influence and control over public life is already unprecedented. Meanwhile, as the company eats up lucrative public contracts funded by taxpayers, it has also exploited loopholes to pay [extremely low rates](#) of tax in some European countries. Palantir is a drain on public wealth.

Dangerous dependence

Europe's increasing dependence on a single company for key services is also a threat to national and popular sovereignty. Palantir's [access](#) to sensitive data, its entrenchment across different parts of the state and the risk of [vendor lock-in](#) exposes public services and national infrastructure to substantial financial and political risk.

It also ties the state to a company it is impossible to trust. Members of Palantir's billionaire leadership have made statements that run counter to ideas of popular power, equality and democracy.

For example, its co-founder and chair Peter Thiel once wrote that he [considered](#) votes for women detrimental to his vision of American capitalism, and that he no longer believed "freedom and democracy are compatible".

The company's proximity to Trump's American nationalist administration makes dependence unwise, not least because the president has shown such willingness to [weaponise](#) US economic and trade relationships. This includes dozens of cases in which Trump's administration has [pressed](#) governments to give up democratically mandated policies to regulate the digital space.

One former Nato adviser has argued that Palantir should be considered a "[vector of malign influence](#)" and warned that embedding Palantir into sensitive systems is "risky". This is not an ambiguous criticism.

Waking up to the threat

Some countries are waking up to the threats posed by Palantir. Switzerland has [rejected](#) Palantir bids at least nine times, while Spain has [banned](#) its state companies from taking on new Palantir contracts. Other countries including the [Netherlands and Denmark](#) are seeking to prevent or end reliance on the firm.

But despite popular pressure, Palantir continues to win new contracts throughout Europe. And European finance is also deepening its stake in Palantir. Over the course of 2025, more than 100 of the continent's largest banks, asset managers, insurers and pension funds [expanded](#) their combined holdings in the company by nearly 70 percent compared to the year before. By the end of 2025, those shares were worth at least \$27 billion.

Beyond Palantir

Palantir's growing foothold in the public sector across Europe is a symptom of a democratic crisis. Governments are responding to popular discontent at the cost of living and defunded services by doubling down on private sector solutions and dubious 'technofixes', while also expanding the use of surveillance and militarised repression.

We call for an urgent change of direction. This means revitalising our democratic structures and institutions, and urgent action to ensure public control and strict regulation of technologies that are already further concentrating power in the hands of a dangerous class of tech billionaires and strengthening authoritarians.

Governments should instead work with companies and workers in the tech industry to develop open-source software as a first priority for data solutions. Our countries and popular movements within them should jointly develop and share technologies with those seeking to steer against the global wave of far-right authoritarianism and the corporations that enable it.

We say Palantir out of our public services!

Demands

European governments and public institutions should:

- Terminate contracts with Palantir Technologies and permanently ban the company from future public contracts
- Develop alternative data solutions compatible with public service – and put in place transparent mechanisms for safeguarding people from mass surveillance
- Protect democracy and guard against the rise of the far right by investing in and democratising public institutions, providing good jobs and services
- Work to build international coalitions against corporate capture by companies like Palantir, building and sharing alternative technological developments
- Europe's public finance institutions must divest from Palantir
